Seppeltsfield Flora Palomino DP117

SEPPELTSFIELD has been described as the most historical winery in the Barossa Valley. If you have been to the Barossa Valley and visited the winery you'd most probably agree. It is a true showpiece of the vision of founder Joseph Seppelt and grandeur of the Barossa during the late 1800s.

The quality of the sherries and other fortified wines being made at Seppeltsfield has no comparison in Australia. This fino, made from Palomino grapes, is a wonderful aperitif. It shows lovely nutty complexity from its seven years maturation under a flor yeast cap. This is a bone dry wine with a crisp, tangy freshness that should be served cold.

2007 Keith Tulloch Hunter Valley Semillon

THE Tulloch name is entrenched in the Hunter Valley. Keith Tulloch is a fourth generation winemaker who worked with several wineries before setting out on his own in 1997. The Semillon grapes that he uses for his wines come from the lower Hunter, from vineyards that were planted in the early 1970s.

This Semillon shows the varietal grapefruit and citrus lime and lemon aromas with added lanolin that comes with a bit of bottle age. The tight acid structure gives it zest and freshness, holding the fruit flavours together well. It is remarkably fresh now, and will certainly cellar well for over a decade.

Barwang Hilltops Cabernet Sauvignon 2008

THERE are a few Hilltops winemakers that are making a name for themselves and their region. Barwang, owned by the family winemakers McWilliams, Moppity Vineyards and Clonakilla to name a few. This is a region that is sure to become more recognised, especially for their red wines, over the coming years, particularly as NSW wine regions, in general, receive more attention.

The 2008 vintage of Barwang cabernet sauvignon shows chocolate, cigar box and blackcurrant fruit aromas. These follow through on the palate with some attractive drying tannins. This wine will mature well, and a few years in the cellar will no doubt offer rewards.
